Some texts talk about what this 'messiah' would be like.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Christians believe that Jesus fulfilled these expectations, and that he is the Messiah. (Jewish people do not think Jesus is the Messiah.)</li> <li>• Christians see Jesus as their Saviour (See Salvation).</li> </ul>	<p>also rescue people from slavery to sin.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Christians apply this idea to living today by trying to serve God and to bring freedom to others; for example, loving others, caring for them, bringing health, food, justice, and telling the story of Jesus.</li> </ul>	<p>Jesus' death was somehow 'for us'.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Christians interpret this in a variety of ways: for example, as a sacrifice for sin; as a victory over sin, death and the devil; paying the punishment as a substitute for everyone's sins; rescuing the lost and leading them to God; leading from darkness to light.</li> <li>• Christians remember Jesus' sacrifice through the service of Holy Communion (also called the Lord's Supper, the Eucharist or the Mass).</li> <li>• Christians believe that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of others, and some are prepared to die for others and for their faith.</li> </ul>	<p>join in.
